

Priority!

2 Cost prohibitive & challenging programmatically to RNV Sliney, therefore, offline.

Similar for Indian Neck – possible use for alternative programs, just not Early Elementary.

- Murphy/Tisko inherent value in conditions & program. To preserve long-term for successful use, need:
 - Infrastructure upgrades (EOUL)
 - Program additions


- High School ~ why it's the "anchor" for other decisions...
 - A Significant needs for infrastructure & some program <u>but...</u>
 - B Makes little sense to fully renovate the existing building without adding other programs.
 - C Therefore, you have the following options:
 - Fill it with program & renovate it (Path A, next slide)
 - "Re-imagine" existing spaces, discard underutilized portions where possible
 - Build new to appropriate size (Path C, next slide)





Time Spent With Friends, 2003-2020






Less Social Teens


Percentage of 12th graders going out with friends two or more times a week
